Question #1

“[Suicide, sex, drugs, abuse, and other issues] touch lives every day, including the lives of children and teens. It’s important to write about them honestly because only then can we gain insight into not only the victims, but also the perpetrators. Without that understanding, we can’t hope to change things for the better.”

The above passage is Ellen Hopkins’s response to book critics who disapprove of her book topics. They claim that her subjects are too mature for her teenaged audience. Is allowing teens to be exposed to “mature” topics through literature more helpful or more harmful?

Question #2
